Temporary Shelter

One of the core services FCJ Refugee Centre provides is temporary shelter to women and children. Currently we have 17 residents in our 3 houses. During this time 2 cases were accepted and 2 cases were refused.

We welcome them and we provide basic settlement services: where to shop, how to use public transit, make a legal aid application, apply for a work/study permit, support with counselling, apply to Ontario works, etc.

Summer time

Summer is an excellent season for our residents to get familiar with the city and learn about entertainment places. They spent a very nice time during their fieldtrips to Woodbine Beach, Central Island, etc.

Workshops

The activities that are provided for this fall are field trip to the museums and workshops that will help them to have a better understanding of Canadian society. An innovation we will try is that the residents will participate not only as audience but also as facilitators. Some of the topics will be chosen by them but most of them will be chosen by the transitional housing worker. By being a workshop facilitator, the residents will develop skills that will be useful for them in the work market, such as being at ease in speaking in front of an audience. It will also help them to be more comfortable in their language skills. All of this is because we believe that the new comers have not only a lot to learn in Canada but they also have a lot to offer. Since some of them held a career in their country, we are giving them the opportunity to share their experiences.



Summer experience

Coming to volunteer to FCJ Refugee Centre is a worthy new experience of migration. Here, you not only support migrants through the programs but you live migration as a whole. FCJ is an open centre that offers people a second house and what's more: a family. Engaging in just one of the areas is difficult as there is so much to do, so in my case I've supported some of them in different aspects. This has given me the opportunity to get to see different migrant realities and program approaches (Human Trafficking, legal area, people support & accompaniment). Volunteering at FCJ you can embrace its philosophy where, for once, people are at the core. I totally recommend people to come and support the FCJ in their own way, strengthening the efforts of this organization/ community.

Toronto Palestinian Film Festival

FCJ Refugee Centre FCJ is a co-presenter for the closing night of the Toronto Palestinian Film Festival. The movie we've been chosen to present is called "On the Bride's Side".

November 2013, Milan, a Palestinian poet and an Italian journalist meet five Palestinians and Syrians who fled the war in Syria to Lampedusa, Italy. They decide to help these refugees continue their journey to Sweden, where they will claim refugee status and hopefully start a new life. To avoid being arrested as traffickers, the filmmakers enlist the help of their friends and disguise the group as a wedding party, complete with a fake bride and wedding guests. Together they embark on an emotional and physical journey across Europe, travelling over 3,000 kilometres in four days. Along the way, the refugees share their harrowing stories, their dreams and fears, leaving a lasting impact on their benevolent "traffickers", and on the

Immigration Help and Refugee Protection

This FCJ team has had a very busy summer, especially during August when we have seen an increasing number of clients looking for support and guidance on several applications, mainly to sponsor family members from outside Canada. These were as a group of five and private sponsorship, particularly from countries immersed in civil conflicts and war.

Simultaneously to the trend above mentioned, we have seen a significant reduction in refugee claims. This is an effect of the recent immigration policies

implemented by the last two immigration ministers.



I would like to mention that the two pillars of the recent reforms have been found by the courts

to be "cruel and unusual" and discriminatory; the cuts to health care for refugees, and the unfair initiative of barring refugees from designated countries of origin to have the right to appeal denied cases through the Refugee Appeal Division – RAD.

We certainly maintain our advocacy for those refugees and clients in need. We can say that something that encourages our commitment is to hear from them that their applications got a positive answer such as three Humanitarian and

Compassionate applications achieved, one PRRA, and two inland refugee claims accepted... Congrats to our successful team, Diana Gallego and Aurora Canales.
