FAMILY DINNER


On the last Wednesday of every month, the FCJ Youth Network gather to celebrate a night full of amazing food, culture and music.

During the Family Dinner, the youth group is ready to share a special recipe that they have selected from home.


The secret of every recipe is a special ingredient: a lot of love!

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NFORMATION FOR PEOPLE CONSIDERING MAKING A REFUGEE CLAIM IN CANADA ENTERING FROM THE USA

Cautions

- If you apply at an official border crossing and you do not meet one of the exceptions to the Safe
 Third Country Agreement, you will not be allowed to make a refugee claim in Canada. You will be
 immediately returned to the USA where you may be detained and put into removal proceedings.
- If you are found ineligible to make a refugee claim for other reasons (for example, you made a
 previous claim in Canada or the USA, or you are inadmissible for serious criminality or security),
 you will face deportation to your country of origin (not the USA). You may be held in immigration
 detention. There will be very little opportunity to show that you are at risk.
- If you are found eligible to make a refugee claim in Canada, you will need to show that you face
 persecution in your country of origin. If you do not face persecution, your claim is likely to be
 rejected and you will face deportation to your country of origin (not the USA).
- It is often difficult to show that you face persecution if you have been outside your country of origin
 and living in the USA for several years.
- Do not expect to have an immediate right to work in Canada. If your claim is eligible, you may apply
 for a work permit but processing can take several months.

A person who makes a refugee claim at an official border crossing (a Port of Entry) is subject to the Safe Third Country Agreement and therefore generally CANNOT make a refugee claim in Canada. When a person is found ineligible to make a refugee claim based on Safe Third Country:

- The person is returned to the USA the same day (generally under a removal order which bars the person from returning to Canada without authorization for 12 months);
- Canadian authorities notify US authorities at US Port of Entry;
- The person can never make another refugee claim in Canada.

There are some exceptions to the general rule.


Despite the Agreement, a person may be able to make a refugee claim in Canada at a Port of Entry if the person

REAKING BARRIERS: RESPONDING TO COMMUNITY NEEDS TOOL KIT

The FCJ Refugee Centre recognizes that all uprooted people have strengths and capacities to contribute to the host country where their migration status is irregular. We understand and empathize with the experiences of precarious migrants who are viewed as disposable/temporary labour in Canada. The Centre strives to offer holistic support and find ways and means to help people formalize their status where possible.

Thus the intention of the Breaking Barriers tool kit is to share information with people with precarious status about access to services, what are the possibilities to regularize their immigration status, and what are their rights. Some of the content you can find:

My name is Edgar Valderrama Medina, I'm currently in the Social Service Worker Program at Seneca College. Looking for placement opportunities can be a bit of a daunting task fraught with uncertainty; especially because placement students rarely have that perfect hindsight regarding the agencies we pour so much time and effort into. Once it came to down to choosing between the FCJ and another agency, my experience so far proven that there has been no need to second guess or regret my choice. Since September 2019, I've been diligently completing my placement hours at the FCJ Refugee Centre.

The days feel short and can be exhausting. However, I know I can count on the support of everyone here to properly process and compartmentalize the difficult situations our clients on their day to day lives.
