
Reunited follows a family divided by war and lets the audience experience the consequences of choices made under huge amounts of pressure.

When Rana and Muhkles are forced to flee the war in Syria in a desperate search for stable and secure futures for their family, they are separated from their children. Rana is in Denmark, Mukhles is in Canada, and their young sons Jad and Nidal, ages 11 and 17, are stuck alone in Turkey. Through small everyday moments captured on video calls and home movies, the film is an intimate and loving portrait of a family in limbo, at the hands of Kafkaesque bureaucracies, combatting physical distance to retain familial bonds and connections. ENGLISH CLASS

Beginner ESL Classes hosted online through Zoom once weekly, with the recent addition of weekly English Conversation Classes for those with more advanced English abilities.

Beginner Class

For the Beginner English Class we send an email to the students every week with the link and the material that we will use in the class. This material includes basic grammar and vocabulary that they are interested in learning. We include exercises that we do together in class, while reviewing all the material. The classes are through the zoom platform, and run on Mondays at 2:00pm (except on long weekends).

Intermediate Level Conversation

For the Intermediate Level Conversation Group the students receive the link every week, also using the Zoom platform. The classes are Thursdays at 4:00pm. This group is for students who already know the basic grammar and vocabulary but want to practice English and work on their confidence to express themselves in daily life.



YOUTH AND ACCESS TO EDUCATION

We have continued to support our incredible network of young people.

We've continued to have our weekly meetings... We moved our youth meetings from our cherished great hall to the great hall via zoom! We've been loving seeing the faces of our youth all across Toronto

We are supporting more than 25 youth, through our group meetings, one on one support, food donations and more.

During the nice weather days this fall we organized fieldtrips to High Park.

The Youth Team has been busy supporting registration and enrollment for children and youth to the TDSB & TCDSB. We continue also supporting Youth in accessing post secondary school options. We have been supporting more than 30 families and youth in referrals and enrollment support.

ANTI-HUMAN TRAFFICKING

Over the last several months, we have continued to support those most vulnerable in our community, which of course includes those who have experienced labour exploitation and human trafficking

32 Temporary Resident Permit (TRP) applications were filled out, and sent to the Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada (IRCC). 28 of these are from an ongoing case of Human Trafficking with the intent of labor exploitation. Half of these have been processed and approved, the rest are still pending approval.

PUBLIC EDUCATION: WEBINARS AND PODCASTS

From June to October we've hosted 33 consecutive webinars, in English, Spanish, Portuguese, and Arabic., with the participation of more than 2,000 attendees. The webinars are now available on our Youtube channel and also on our website.

Our Public Education program has been expanded through the production of podcasts. Once a week we keep producing podcasts on different topics. So far we have podcasts on how to do a work permit, Refugee Hearing tips, Housing Needs, How to Read Food Labels, Women's Entrepreneurs Skills, etc.

Beside the video and audio productions, the documents are also available on our website under Publications &Documents section.

The initiatives we are implementing through our Public Education Program (webinars, podcast, etc) are thanks to the support we are receiving from The Law Foundation of Ontario.
